
DR. J. PATERSON-SMYTH, ARCHDEACON, IS DEAD

*Prelate of Montreal and Noted
Writer—Formerly Professor
at Dublin University.*

MONTREAL, Feb. 14 (AP).—Archdeacon John Paterson-Smyth, distinguished cleric and a writer of note, died today at the age of 80. He retired from the rectorship of St. George's Parish Church in 1926 after a ministry of nearly twenty years. Dr. Paterson-Smyth came to Canada in 1907 from Ireland where he held appointments, both pastoral and academic.

Among his writings "The Gospel of the Hereafter," "The Men Who Died in Battle" and "People's Life of Christ" achieved wide circulation on this continent and in Great Britain.

At Trinity College, Dublin, Archdeacon Paterson-Smyth was a double first-honors man, a triple-prize man and Senior Moderator on the Gold Medal list in Moral and Mental Philosophy. Before he left Ireland in 1907 he had been rector of St. Anne's Church in Dublin, chaplain to the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and Professor of Pastoral Theology at Dublin University.
