St. Matthew's Church, Quebec

On Thursday afternoon, February 25th., there was laid to rest in Mount Herman Cemetery, all that was mortal of one who in his lifetime was a good and true man, a staunch Churchman, and a sincere friend. James Laurie was a member of a well known Quebec family, and was a graduate in Arts and Medicine of Bishop's College, Lennoxville. After travelling in Europe, he settled in Quebec, where he remained for almost all the rest of his life. He was a devoted member of St. Matthew's Church, and held the office of Rector's Warden for about seventeen years. He was always ready to help in any good work, and was a generous contributor to the support of all branches of Church work. He was a cheery and unselfish disposition, always looking on the bright side of things, and by his example helping others to do the same. He was singularly true in his nature, and as a friend never failed. His death occurred at the age of sixty-six, at Atlantic City, after an illness of some weeks, which he bore with unflinching courage and patience. The news of his death came as a great shock to his many friends who were not aware that he was ill. To his widow, and his son, Lieutenant-Commander James Laurie, Royal Canadian Navy, the sympathy of many friends goes forth, with the prayer that Our Heavenly Father will bless and comfort them in their great loss.

**Obituary**

**ARCHDEACON PATERSON SMYTH**

News was received of the death on Feb. 14th, in Montreal, of the Rev. Archdeacon John Paterson Smyth. Dr. Paterson Smyth was born in Ireland and was ordained in 1880 as curate of Lisburn Cathedral. After some years of parish work in Ireland he was made Professor of Pastoral Theology in his old university of Trinity College, Dublin. In 1907 he came to Canada to succeed the Right Rev. James Carmichael at St. George's Church. For nearly twenty years he was rector of that church and was much loved by his parishioners, and by all associated with him in his wider work for the Diocese as Archdeacon and a governor of the Diocesan College. He resigned from active work in November, 1926. His last message to his parish-

ioners from the pulpit of St. George's Church was characteristic of the whole outlook of the man, as he urged them to look smilingly into the future.

Dr. Paterson Smyth was known far beyond the limits of Canada through his books. He wrote on theological and religious subjects in a way that made them intensely interesting to a very wide public. Few religious books in recent years have had a wider circulation or been more appreciated by lay people. "The Gospel of the hereafter", ran to more than 80,000 copies and has been translated into several European and Oriental languages. His "How We Got Our Bible", sold 130,000 copies. "A People's Life of Christ", has been reprinted 34 times. The secret of the popularity of Dr. Paterson Smyth's books is not hard to find: in a style that is easy and straight forward, a wide scholarship is combined with an unflinching human touch in dealing with subjects of eternal interest to mankind. It was the genius of Dr. Paterson Smyth to be able to set forth the results of his learning with a simplicity and practical application to daily life that could not fail to make an appeal to the ordinary man. He has passed on into that Unseen World of which he thought and spoke so often, but he has left this world the richer for his being here.



**CHARLES GORE AND FRANK THEODORE WOODS**

The Church of England in the Mother Country and, indeed, the whole Anglican Communion have suffered a great loss, lately, in the deaths of the Right Reverend Charles Gore and the Right Reverend Theodore Woods.

The "Church Times" speaking of Bishop Gore in a leading article, says:—"Charles Gore was a great man, great in character, great in achievement. No man of his generation has left so deep a mark on the religious life of his time. He was a profound scholar, a subtle thinker, a reformer and a Saint."

He was a great Bishop, whether as Chief Pastor of the Diocese of Worcester, Birmingham or Oxford, but he will be chiefly remembered for all time as the greatest Theological Scholar and writer of his day whose many literary works were looked forward to with eagerness and read with keen appreciation.

He was, moreover, a man of wide and varied interests. He was the founder of the Community of the Resurrection at Mirfield, and also of the Christian Social Union. In a word, it is safe to say that
